Last Rites for Col. E. B. Sauter Held at Tuttle

Funeral services 'were held at 2 p. m. Friday in St. Paul's Lutheran church at Tuttle for Eberhard B. Sauter, 70, of Tuttle, who died in a Bismarck hospital last Monday. He had been in failing health for the past five years and hospitalized several times during that period.

The Rev. V. G. Schnaidt officiated. Interment was made in the Tuttle cemetery. Pallbearers were Paul and Wilbert Magstadt, Ardwin and Laverne Freeh, George Leitner, and Fred Steffan.

Music was provided by Mrs. Gus Olson and Mrs. Herbert Leno, who sang two duets: "God's Tomorrow" and "Just A Closer Walk with Thee". A German selection was also sung by Mrs. Olson, Mrs. A. Schwindt, Mrs. Fred Trautman, John Rath and John Trautman. Mrs. Robert Dolan was organist.

Born August 10, 1883, in South Russia, Mr. Sauter came to the United States in 1896 with his parents, who settled at Harvey. He married Mathilda Freeh there on July 8, 1906, and that same year homesteaded southeast of Arena, where he resided until moving to Tuttle in 1922.

In addition to farming, Mr. Sauter was a cattle buyer, auctioneer, and engaged in the implement business.

He leaves his widow and the following sons and daughters: Walter, Fred, Edwin, Louise, Mrs. Clifford Riskedahl, Ruby, and Mrs. Arthur Scherbenske, all of Tuttle; Mrs. William E. Hinkel, Jamestown; Mrs. Jack Bailey, Bismarck; and Mrs. Harold Glanville, Wing.

Mr. Sauter also leaves three sisters, Mrs. Margaret Magstadt, Harvey; Mrs. Barbara Leitner, Fessenden, and Mrs. Mary Steffan, Minot; 15 grandchildren, and one great grandchild. Two brothers and four sisters preceded him in death.
